The Town of Newburgh received bids for the Newburgh Recreation Center Project on 04 April 2024.

A total of 14 bids were received for this project with the apparent low bidder being O'Connor Company.

Our office undertook Contractor vetting by contacting six (6) provided references, finding no significant negative performance issues. In addition, our office, accompanied by personnel from Holt Construction, performed an in person interview with the CEO and other senior members of O'Connor Company.

Given this project is being performed under a PLA, this will be a single contract project with the General Construction Contractors selecting subcontractors for all trades. Attached is the proposed list of subcontractors provided by O'Connor Company. Please be aware the subcontractors are under the direction of O'Connor Company and the subcontractors may change with or without notice. Due to this arrangement, the subcontractors are not vetted by MHE.

Upon review of the bid documentation, O'Connor Company was the apparent low bidder for the project. We have also reviewed the bid documentation from O'Connor Company, and find that it is in an acceptable form.

MHE has reviewed the bids including all bid alternates and recommends the awarding of the base bid, which includes all original windows as well as the hardwood basketball court floors, Bid Alternate 1A-1E (Gym Space Air Conditioning), and Bid Alternate 2 (Stone Veneer).

If the Town feels the cost is acceptable, we recommend award to O'Connor Company of North Carolina for the total contract amount of \$12,106,111.00.

Dear Supervisor Piaquadio,

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation has released its latest revision of the MS4 General Permit (GP-0-24-001) on January 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2024. This new permit is requiring a long list of MS4 program updates and revisions be carried out across the 5-year permit term length, with each set of items having specific compliance timeframes. One of these requirements is to update the body of the Municipal Stormwater Management Plan to conform with the parameters of the new permit. It is strongly encouraged authorization is given to make the necessary updates by the most recent deadline, which is July 3<sup>rd</sup> 2024 and the 1-year deadline of January 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2025. These requirements for these deadlines are as follows:

- Revise Illicit Discharge "Track down & Elimination" procedure & train a portion of municipal staff on these procedures. (1 year)
- Develop & define Construction oversite program. (1 year)
- Develop a Construction Site Inventory. (6 month)
- Revise construction site inspection procedure. (1 year)
- Drainage District inspection and maintenance record tracking. (1 year)
- Revise post construction inspection procedure. (1 year)
- Update street sweeping procedure. (6 month)

In addition to these required updates, the NYSDEC is requiring MS4 Interim Progress Certifications twice a year, with the first one's submission deadline being October 1<sup>st</sup> 2024. These certifications convey the municipality is progressing with compliance items to the NYSDEC. These updates and certifications will be completed at the MS4 task rate outlined in MHE's municipal work agreement upon authorization by the municipality. Our office is providing a breakfast catered MS4 Training on 17 May 2024 that will cover this topic in more detail, where municipal staff is encouraged to attend.

#### Project Description, Background and Reasons Supporting the Negative Declaration:

The Town of Newburgh's Nob Hill Sewer District Wastewater Treatment Plant (Plant, or WWTP) was constructed in 1985 and serves 55 homes. The Plant operates under State Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (SPDES) Permit NY 0145599. A new permit was issued on September 1, 2021 and has an expiration date of August 31, 2026. A subsequent modified permit was issued on 7 July 2023. The updated permit has set new effluent limitations for

CBOD5, Ammonia (as N), Fecal Coliform, Total Residual Chlorine, and Dissolved Oxygen. The Schedule of Compliance within the SPDES permit requires construction of improvements to meet new limits to be completed by November 2026. A new 2-stage package plant with UV Disinfection is proposed to replace the sand filter beds at the existing Plant to meet the permit limitations.

Because the area to be disturbed by the Project is fully within the existing footprint of the WWTP, involves relatively minor earthwork, and will restore pre-construction conditions, there are expected to be no significant adverse environmental impacts, as outlined below.

#### Impact on Land:

The Nob Hill WWTP is located on Town-owned land. The proposed improvements will disturb approximately 0.5 acres of the existing 2.3-acre site and will not require substantial amounts of clearing, filling, or grading. The improvements to the Plant will not substantially affect the character of the property nor impact adjacent properties or resources.

#### Impact on Water:

The Plant's effluent discharges to a minor tributary west of the Hudson River. The proposed improvements at the Plant do not include modifications within the area of the outfall. Trenches may need to be dewatered when excavating, however erosion and sedimentation control practices will be utilized to ensure surface waters will not be affected by any work done for this Project. Therefore there are no anticipated negative impacts on ground or surface water, temporarily or permanently.

#### Impact on Traffic:

The Project is located off of a residential street (Peach Terrace) and the work is contained to the area off of the existing access road to the Plant. During construction there will be an increase in truck traffic in the area for delivery of materials. No significant degradation of service at any nearby intersection will result from the Project.

### Impact on Wildlife, Threatened or Endangered Species:

The NYSDEC database on Rare and Endangered species noted that the Project site is within a 2.5-mile radius of a documented siting of the Indiana bat, which is listed as Endangered in New York State and at the federal level. The bat could therefore be using trees on the site for roosting. If incidental tree clearing is necessary, it will be completed between November 1 and March 31. No other rare species were identified at this site. Local wildlife populations are not likely to be impacted by the Project other than being deterred to use the site during the construction phase because of noise from and presence of machinery.

#### Impact on Energy, Noise, Odor and Public Health:

The Project requires the installation of an electrical services, as the Plant currently runs without service. It is anticipated that service will be pulled from a nearby utility pole serving the homes in the area. Odors produced from the Plant will not be significantly more than current conditions. The new equipment will raise ambient noise slightly; however, the equipment will be enclosed. Typical construction noise will occur over the 12 month construction period but no blasting will take place.

#### Impact on Aesthetic and Community Resources:

The existing facility has been on the site for many decades and is a known, although minor in terms of appearance, component of the built environment. The site has not and will not be used as a community resource other than sewage treatment. No impacts to aesthetic or community resources have been identified as occurring because of this Project.

#### **Growth Inducing Impacts:**

The Project does not propose expansion of the District, only improvement in treatment for existing users. Therefore no growth inducing impacts will result from the Project.

#### **Other Impacts:**

Based on a review of the Full EAF, plans, and the Map, Plan and Report, the Town of Newburgh has not identified any potential significant impacts that will result from the Nob Hill Wastewater Treatment Plant Disinfection Project.
